Dear St. Paul's,

I hope this update finds you and your family in good health and staying safe. It is with deep sadness that I take note of how many people have suffered setbacks due to the ongoing crisis. Nevertheless, together we will persevere; we will come through this bent, but not bowed. And there is some truly good news to share that underscores that belief.

For those of you who haven't heard, Amazon founder Jeff Bezos made a very generous gift to Feeding America, which in turn divided it amongst scores of food distribution organizations across the country. Gleaners has received a portion of those funds, which are to be used immediately to support food distribution efforts. The vast bulk of it will be used to buy food, and a portion of it will be credited to our partner agencies in order to give them more resources for distributions as well. In this way, what is good for one is good for all.

In fact, Gleaners typically works with more than 500 partner agencies to help distribute food to over 100,000 households every month; the crisis has increased that number to approximately 150,000 households every month! That collaborative approach has its historical roots in Detroit community leaders and organizations brainstorming about how best to feed the hungry. In the late seventies that included Gene Gonya, Al and Midge Feliska, the Food Industry Council of the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce, the Capuchin Soup Kitchen, Father John McGrail - Provincial of the Jesuit Community, and the Archdiocese of Detroit. They laid the groundwork for what would become Gleaners Community Food Bank.

Although many of our collaborative partners have changed with the passage of time, our overall vision remains the same: to end hunger in southeast Michigan. One of our more recent contributors, the nonprofit organization Catholic Foundation of Michigan, has included Gleaners as a charitable giving option on their own website for COVID-19 relief efforts. We thank them and the many other groups who have stepped up to help anyone and everyone in need—including Gleaners.

And on the subject of 'good,' Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan generously donated two new refrigerated vans to help Gleaners broaden the distribution of fresh milk. Given the national dearth of shelf-stable milk, these vans will help us leverage the abundance of fresh milk that has developed thanks to dairy farmers who are making it available to food banks for only the cost of packaging and shipping. This dramatically reduces the cost per gallon that Gleaners will have to pay, which means we can serve even more families in need during the crisis. In fact, the nation's entire dairy and farming community deserves our thanks for everything they continue to do to feed people in need, even when they themselves are shouldering so much hardship.

Thank you, too, to General Motors for sending us more face masks last week. Despite having limited amounts on hand, we are distributing personal protection equipment (PPE) to as many partner agencies as possible.

Our expanded mobile distributions continue, and through this effort we have served 38,000 households since mid-March—a 40% increase over the same time last year. Given the current need and our level of activity, we've had to lease additional warehouse space in southwest Detroit for added storage and staging space to build quarantine food boxes.

Over the last two weeks, 10 National Guard members have been helping us build quarantine food boxes in our Pontiac warehouse. By April 20th we will have delivered 10,000 of those boxes statewide to 16 various Area Agencies on Aging for distribution to vulnerable seniors. This is a wonderful collaboration, especially because those agencies have the capacity and volunteer network needed to manage deliveries to individual homes.

Gleaners plans to continue our elevated level of operations for as long as needed. Moreover, we are carefully monitoring those needs and will increase our services accordingly. Some of our smaller partner agencies have been especially hard hit and have ceased operations because of illness from the coronavirus. This makes Gleaners' mobile distributions more critical than ever.

If it weren't for your support, none of this would be possible. For that, I can't thank you enough. But I will be in touch again soon to let you know how, together, we are making progress.


# Open the Eyes of My Heart


