An update from the PNC...

The PNC diligently continues our search for St. Paul's next called pastor. We are meeting weekly, and at times twice a week, to do our due diligence to research, follow up, and have conversations with prospective candidates. As you can imagine, the pandemic had an effect on the search process, but we have remained dedicated in our continued search. Currently within the PCUSA, there are 1495 churches seeking solo pastors with 346 candidates searching. We realize you may be feeling anxious with Paul's retirement quickly approaching. Please keep the faith! Say your prayers! We are working hard and remind ourselves that this will happen in God's time, not ours. We remain faithful that God is guiding us and with us in our search. We ask for your continued prayers and support as we move forward.

Pastoral Care: Upon Paul's retirement on June 30, what will St. Paul's do for pastoral care? Although the Rev. Joanne Morgan's relationship with St. Paul's as Parish Associate terminates with Paul's retirement, she has agreed to handle the coordination of pastoral care needs in the interim. If someone is hospitalized, we encourage you to phone the office or call Jo directly. Funeral arrangements and hospital visitation may be arranged with Rev. Jo and may include elders helping with follow-up in the gap between Paul's retirement and the arrival of a new pastor.


